August 17 Meeting Demonstration Bowl Turning – Various Techniques

In this bowl turning demonstration, I'll show the different orientation of mounting log sections for traditional and natural edge bowls. I will also show different methods for holding the wood on the lathe and different methods and tools used to make essential cuts in the wood.

Bowl turning is fun and easy. I enjoy the fluid movements and relaxation I get out of turning a bowl. Since the club is asking everyone to help create bowls for the 'Empty Bowls' project I thought this would be a good demo topic.



I started woodworking in the early 1990's making furniture and built-in cabinets for our home. I bought my first lathe in 2002 and was self-taught for the first couple of years. I then got involved with the Dallas Area Woodturners (DAW) club and the American Association of Woodturners, which was a big help in exposing me to all kinds of turning and training. I am now the treasurer for the DAW club and will continue to serve on the board for the next few years. I am also the Vice Chair on the City of Allen Public Art Committee.

I have learned a lot about turning by watching club demos, taking some classes, going to SWAT and visiting with other turners. I also read a lot, watched a bunch of YouTube videos and practiced and practiced.

After being in the tech industry for 23 years, I now own and operate the Woodturning Tool Store, an online retailer dedicated to providing quality tools and equipment to the wood turning community.

Empty Bowls and Beads of Courage by Lou Beaudreaux

Five members donated 29 Empty Bowls at our July meeting, bringing our total for 2017 to 47. Four Beads of Courage boxes were also contributed, one of which was a 2017 kit. To date, we have received 23 boxes and nine of the 28 kits adopted by members. Empty Bowls and Beads of Courage results for 2017 are shown below; as a club we have achieved about 15% of our Empty Bowls goal of 300, and 28% of out Beads of Courage goal of 50.

Several members have asked what size Empty Bowls or Beads of Courage boxes should be. The minimum size for an Empty Bowl is 5" outside diameter. The Beads of Courage program has established the following dimensions for their boxes:

Interior Diameter – Minimum of 5", (6" preferred)

Interior Height – Minimum of 4" (5" or greater preferred)

Speaking of Christmas Ornaments: Christmas Ornaments Bassett Style

A one-day class will focus on producing light-weight Christmas ornaments. This little project is an excellent exercise in building your hollowing and spindle skills while working on a small scale. We will first hollow an orb to reduce weight then create a spectacular finial finish. It is a great project to finish in a single day. Design and decoration/finishing will be discussed. We will provide wood for two ornaments and a set of small hollowing tools. If you have your own small hollowing tools, please feel free to bring them.

COST: \$35.00 (includes hand-ground small hollowing tool)

MEMBER INSTRUCTOR: Kevin Bassett

Tools needed: a medium sized gouge for roughing out, a small detail gouge or skew chisel. (Whatever you are most comfortable with for small detail spindle turning); small set of hollowing tools. Also useful but not necessary are a 3/4" Forstner bit, a 3/4" spanner wrench (sharpened to cut finial tenons.)

What you don't have, don't worry - no need to run out and buy tools - but you may want to after the class!

WE WILL HAVE OPEN SHOP ON August 19, Following our regular D.A.W. Meeting on Thursday, August 17th! The theme will be bowl turning and sharpening your tools. Or, bring your special projects to Open Shop.

Open Shops run from 9:00 a.m. - 4:00 p.m. at Wood World.

- 1) Please remember to park in the alley behind the store.
- 2) All stock prep needs to be done previously before coming to Open Shop. *If stock prep is necessary at Wood World, ask Wood World Employees to assist in the use of any Wood World Machinery.
- 3) All members attending Open Shop must adhere to the A.A.W. Safety Rules Guidelines...handouts will be provided at Open Shop. These safety Guidelines include wearing a face shield while turning, (face shields are available for loan or purchase), and wearing leather shoes when working at the Open shop.
- 4) Please check your tool bags and boxes before leaving Open Shop, too insure that all D.A.W. Tools have been returned to the Lathe Tool Box you checked out at the Open Shop. Also, make sure you have all of your personal tools accounted for......your personal tools should be marked before bringing them to Open shop.


AnchorSeal
